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Introduction

Can you imagine being given the wrong prescription and then later dying from taking incorrect medicine for an illness? That's what happened to Dawn Britton, a 62-year-old woman from Great Britain. Mrs. Britton had Crohn's disease and regularly received pills to help her cope with her condition. But one day her local pharmacist accidently gave her a prescription for treating diabetes.

The pills looked like the same size and color of her other medication, so for a couple weeks she swallowed the medicine. Eventually she fell into a coma since the prescription lowered her blood sugar level. A month later she died. Her children were rightfully upset. They were counseled to let it go. Her son Lee, 41, said:

"We were told it was not in the public interest to prosecute, but how can people be allowed to get away with killing our mother? That's what it amounts to." He then adds, "I work as a gas meter reader; I am expected to spot any problems at customers' houses. If I checked a meter and then it blew up the next day, I'd be held accountable. Yet here, our mum has been killed, and it's simply swept under the carpet. It's disgraceful."

There's another disgrace taking place in Seventh-day Adventist churches across North America. Members are dying in our churches. I don't mean that church leaders are dispensing wrong prescriptions after worship services in the foyer. Fewer and fewer members are stepping up to serve in the church. Some have burned themselves out and quit. Others feel too busy to commit any of their time to help out. The challenges are not all the same. Neither are the solutions. We cannot use a one-size-fits-all approach to service.

Equip is a seminar based on the belief that it is normal for every Seventhday Adventist Christian to serve in the body of Christ and be a witness in the community. We believe in the priesthood of all members and the giftedness of every believer. We believe God has a joyful place of service for every member. Each person is unique and therefore has a special way of contributing to the body.

Equip uses four teaching sessions to open a pathway to service. Four parts of the body are used to capture the four steps to service:

- Hearing God's call to service (heart)

- Finding places of service (hand)
- Committing to step forward in ministry for Christ (feet).

The *Equip* resource brings health and strength to disciples in the church. The seminar will call, coach, connect, and commit every member to places of service that will build up the body of Christ, reach our communities, and help others prepare for Christ's coming.



The Bible illustrates different types of gifts. It does not give us an exhaustive list. We should be open to a variety of skills used to build up the body of Christ.

<u>Hospitality</u> . The gift of hospitality is the divine ability to extend a warm welcome to people needing fellowship, food, and shelter.
<u>Intercessory Prayer</u> . The gift of intercessory prayer is the divine ability to intercede in prayer for others with consistency and awareness of spiritual battles being waged.
<u>Interpretation</u> . The gift of interpretation is the divine ability to share the meaning of a message with others from a person speaking God's truth in a foreign language.
Knowledge . The gift of knowledge is the divine ability to discover biblical truth which is pertinent to the well-being of the body.
<u>Leadership</u> . The gift-role of leadership is the divine ability to influence people toward a goal by providing oversight, motivation, and vision. Leadership is an equipping gift-role and contributes direction to the church.
Mercy . The gift of mercy is the divine ability to feel genuine compassion for others who are suffering and seek to practically alleviate pain and discomfort of the hurting, wounded, and marginalized.
Prophecy . The gift-role of prophet is the divine ability to receive and communicate a timely message from God for his people, exposing sin or deception for the purpose of reconciliation. Prophecy is an equipping gift-role and brings conviction to the church.
Shepherding . The gift-role of pastor-shepherd is the divine ability to train others to provide for the spiritual welfare of a group of believers. Shepherds equip others to give nurture to the church.
Teaching . The gift-role of teacher is the divine ability to communicate information relevant to the health and ministry of the body and its members in such a way that others will learn. Teachers train members by providing the application of truth to believers in the church.
<u>Tongues</u> . The gift of tongues is the divine ability to speak in foreign languages in order to communicate a message by God.
<u>Wisdom</u> . The gift of wisdom is the divine ability to receive insight into how to proceed in specific situations arising in the body of Christ.

Verified Volunteers Training

Verified Volunteers (VV) is a service dedicated to raising child abuse awareness and providing registration, training and background checks for all Seventh-day Adventist volunteers and employees working with minors. VV is a division of Law Room, a company that also helps businesses with legal issues such as sexual harassment, discrimination, hiring, wages, etc.

The VV training curriculum is endorsed by the North American Division of Seventh-day Adventists. VV provides a version of their curriculum specifically designed for the Seventh-day Adventist Church. This curriculum teaches volunteers and employees how to detect abuse and neglect, as well as how to guard children against dangers in today's society.

Volunteer Code of Conduct

Acknowledgment

Because I want the best possible environment for our children and youth to grow up in, it is important that those working with children have guidelines for conduct in order to protect both themselves and those under their care. As a ministry volunteer, I want parents and others to feel comfortable and confident with me.

My Commitment to Volunteer Ministry As a Youth/Children's Ministry Volunteer, I will:

- 1. Provide appropriate adult supervision at all times for the children for whom I am responsible.
- 2. Have at least one other adult, eighteen (18) years of age or older, to help with the supervision of children. If I find myself in a situation where I am the only adult present, under no circumstances will I allow myself to be alone with one child (the "two-person rule"). This protects the child as well as protecting the adult from possible allegations.
- 3. Ask a child's permission before physically touching him/her anywhere, even when responding to an injury or problem. This is especially true for any areas that would normally be covered by a T-shirt and/or shorts. If an injury is within this area, make sure another adult works with you as care is provided.
- 4. Refrain from physical and verbal attacks and corporal punishment which are inappropriate behaviors and should never be used as discipline. "Time outs" or "sit-in-that-chair" may be helpful discipline methods to use with children.
- 5. Affirm children with appropriate touching by keeping hugs brief and "shoulder-to-shoulder" or "side-to- side." I will keep hands at (not below) the shoulder level. For small children who like to sit on laps, I will encourage them to sit next to me.

- 6. Provide extra care when taking small children to the restroom. I will take another adult along, or leave the door open.
- 7. Be aware of conducting activities in rooms that do not have an interior viewing area, or I will leave the door open during the activity to allow easy observation by others.
- 8. Cooperate with the volunteer screening process and complete the Volunteer Ministry Information form, as required by the church.
- 9. Be aware of the signs and symptoms of child abuse and aware of the legal requirements for reporting suspected cases of abuse. In addition to any legally required reporting, I agree that if I become aware of any behavior by another individual which seems abusive or inappropriate towards children I am supervising, I will report that behavior to the church pastor, elder, or directly to the Conference Treasurer's or Risk Management Director.
- 10. Cooperate with church leadership in conducting children and youth ministries by being a volunteer who is loving, kind, firm, and always a thoroughly professional person. Working with children and youth is not only a privilege; it is also a serious responsibility that must be approached with utmost care.
- 11. Participate in orientation and training programs conducted by the church.
- 12. Uphold the standards of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.
- * In the event I find it impossible to comply with the above, I will comply as closely as possible with the Code of Conduct and act in good faith for the welfare of the people involved.
- ** This code of conduct form does not replace the necessary Verified Volunteers training and background check, but provides reinforcement the conduct of volunteers who work with children and youth.
